Darrell would always connect with Dexter, finding ways for the student to safely assist or engage with him. When Dexter was struggling with behaviour, a visit or talk with Darrell always seemed to help turn the day around. When this was pointed out to Darrell, his response was, "When I am having a rough day, I come to the school because Dexter makes my day better." The school identified Darrell as a valued part of Dexter's support team. This extended to Darrell participating in weekly TEAMS video calls when the school transitioned to remote learning. One could say Darrell's impact on Dexter was "electric!" Darrell Gottfried is a most deserved recipient of a Yes I Can Certificate of Recognition.

Westwood Collegiate St. James-Assiniboia School Division

As a result, countless hours were spent during the summer learning the braille code. Nelli maintains a strong rapport with her student and looks for every opportunity to promote independence. She looks forward to coming to work every day and for her it is more than a job. Nelli sees opportunities to make a difference not only with the student with whom she works but also with the students she comes into contact with every day. Brooklands School St. James-Assiniboia School Division

Joelle has demonstrated outstanding work in her role as an Educational Assistant at Brooklands School during the past 10 years. She brings a calm, clear and consistent demeanor to her work in supporting students who have behaviour challenges and exhibit aggressive and off task behaviours. Joelle is empathetic and kind and is able to readily redirect and refocus students and respond to their needs while maintaining their dignity and without escalating their behaviours. Difficult situations are handled with creativity and positivity and she always seem to find the "silver lining" in any situation. One of her strongest skills is her ability to naturally diffuse power struggles between students before they escalate into aggression. She works closely with the classroom teachers and student services department to implement behaviour and support plans and personally infuses each plan with love and compassion. With Joelle's support several students re-enter classrooms equipped with well practiced strategies and skills that have helped them navigate through formerly derailing stressors and triggers. Joelle's assets as an Educational Assistant have been recognized by The Winnipeg Jets Hockey Academy for the caring and helpful manner she displays with students involved in the hockey program and her ability to connect with students with challenges and to engage them in programming. Her "on ice" skills as an instructor are valued as well. She has gained the respect of parents, many who have commented on her positive attitude and her genuine appreciation of their children. Joelle actively pursues professional learning opportunities to gain further strategies for working with her students.

Not only has her work with individual students been exemplary, she has made a significant contribution to the school and the community at large. Within the school Joelle has demonstrated leadership in a number of initiatives including the Walking School Bus program; a school-wide active recess plan; Mighty Muscles, a lunch time exercise group; and a Bike/Walk/Roll school wide activity challenge in conjunction with Green Action to name a few. One of her major contributions has been the creation of the Brooklands Bike Fleet which provides eighty free bikes available for student use. Joelle has organized several bike repair stations and has volunteered her time to assist with bicycle maintenance and repair. In the community Joelle coaches and referee's ringette and sits on a number of boards.

She has also learned to engage with the device when supported by adults or modeled by peers and is also learning to communicate through sign language and picture communication symbols. When transitioning to middle school next year, Carlyn will continue these trends to build strong relationships with family, friends and engage in new social opportunities and experiences. Carlyn is an excellent candidate to receive a Yes I Can award for Technology.

MARK DRAPER

Springfield Middle School Sunrise School District

"Mark is an amazing young man filled with a joyous spirit and never-ending determination." He is a grade 8 student at Springfield Middle School in the Sunrise School Division. Mark was a late talker and began school with only a few words and signs. He used an iPad as an assistive communication device to connect in the classroom and when playing with friends. During grade five and six when Mark was away from school undergoing medical procedures, his iPad became his voice. He used it to communicate wants and needs in the hospital and then back at home while he was recovering. When Mark returned to school in grade 7, he was able to jump right back into social interaction with teachers and peers, using his iPad to assist with interactions. Mark has made great progress and technology will continue to strengthen his voice so that he can really shine.

HARLEY ENGLISH

Phoenix School St. James Assiniboia School Division

Harley is a grade 4 student who attends Phoenix School in St. James Assiniboia School Division. Harley enjoys listening and sharing stories, which he does with the use of Pictello. This year he has been working on increasing his communication with both his peers and adults. Harley has recently learned to used a jellybean switch to turn the pages of his stories on his own and turn on the classroom lighting. His friends are happy to see Harley achieving his goals. La Verendrye School Portage la Prairie School Division

Dylan is a grade 6 student at La Verendrye School in Portage la Prairie. Dylan incorporates technology into his daily routine, and this has offered him a number of valuable learning tools to assist his growth and development. During remote learning, Dylan used Google Classroom and Wakelet to connect with and organize his educational opportunities. While he previously used an iPad, in middle years he has been introduced to a Chromebook on which he accesses applications to support his learning. Instead of struggling in the classroom, Dylan will actively choose technology options to engage in areas of learning that he enjoys. He enjoys several adaptive technology programs and has his own YouTube channel known as "DylanTube." Overall, Dylan exemplifies the spirit of the Yes I Can Awards through his excellent use of technology.

EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR

MYRIAME ORLOFF

George Waters Middle School St. James Assiniboia School Division

Myriame's work has been exemplary as a middle year's teacher and most recently as a full-time counsellor at George Waters Middle School.

As a classroom teacher Myriame established strong, personal connections with her students and addressed their diverse needs through a strength-based approach that incorporated student interests in the overall lesson plan. Hands-on experiential learning activities were provided and a high level of student engagement maintained utilizing the Optimal Learning Model. An inviting, caring environment was created and a culture of acceptance and inclusion established in which all students felt welcomed and respected and were able to participate in every conversation and lesson. Myriame has brought the same passion, innovation and creativity from the larger classroom setting to her work with smaller groups, individual students and in the classroom when working along side staff as a school counsellor. She uses research-based methods to approach her counselling and thinks and adapts quickly to meet the needs of her students. Myriame is caring, compassionate and exceedingly patient as she strives to help students navigate and problem solve difficult situations. She's a life-long learner and sets high expectations for students and herself. In her short time in her role she also has provided mentorship for a few "school counsellors" in training. She has been actively involved in numerous school committees and coaching over the years and initiated the GSA Diversity Alliance group along with two support staff which was a safe place for all students to come, talk and learn about the LGBTQ+ community. Myriame co-facilitated student participation in the Special Olympics Program; coached the School Improv team and Co-Directed the school play at the middle years and high school levels for many years.

Myriame has been described as a high energy, self-starter who embraces new challenges and situations. She is also compassionate, hard-working and totally dedicated to making a positive difference in the lives of her students!
